A Snapshot of the Voluntary Sector in the... Coatbridge Area



OCAL AREA...

The Coatbridge area has a population of 47,730 (2011 census). Coatbridge is the area's biggest town with a population of 43,970 (2012 estimate). The area is split into the three wards of Coatbridge North and Glenboig (Ward 6), Coatbridge West (Ward 9), and Coatbridge South (Ward 10). Outside the main town of Coatbridge, Glenboig village is situated rurally to north of the town and Bargeddie is situated to the west bordering Glasgow's local authority area.

Leisure activities and tourism is a main focus of Coatbridge, with facilities such as Summerlee Museum. The Time Capsule, Showcase Cinema, Hollywood Bowl and Drumpellier Country Park. Significant employers in the local area include Tannoy Ltd and New College Lanarkshire. Coatbridge is also home to Albion Rovers Football Club.

Scottish Index for Multiple Deprivation results from 2012 indicated that some areas of Coatbridge have some of the poorest health statistics in Scotland. It is estimated that one in five residents of Coatbridge are classified as obese.

SECTORAL PROFILE...

Voluntary Action North Lanarkshire research indicates that 280 voluntary sector organisations listed premises in the Coatbridge area as their main address (as at 2015), with an estimated total 1300 voluntary sector organisations, including a high proportion of local authority wide and national organisations, having a footprint in the Coatbridge area during the period April 2014 to March 2015. Key investors in the voluntary sector locally include North Lanarkshire Council, Scottish Government, The Big Lottery Fund, Voluntary Action Fund, and several private sector trust funds.

The profile of the voluntary sector in Coatbridge is fairly diverse, with a healthy mixture of small and large organisations based in the area and providing a wide range of services. With health and employability levels in the Coatbridge area sitting below the North Lanarkshire average, it is clear that the voluntary sector has responded to the needs of local citizens with the type of services provided (for example, North Lanarkshire Leisure Ltd's central base for leisure activities is in Coatbridge, and Lanarkshire Community Food and Health Partnership promotes healthy eating from its base in Bargeddie).

Coatbridge town centre is somewhat short of a recognised hub for voluntary sector activity, although the Fountain Business Centre does house a few voluntary sector organisations. A modern community hub and sports facility adjacent to St Andrew's High School is operational to the south of Coatbridge. Drumpellier Country Park provides a focal point for much conservation and outdoors sectoral activity.

VOLUNTEERING...

From January 2014 to December 2014, 220 new volunteers from the Coatbridge area were successfully matched with local volunteering opportunities through support provided by the local Third Sector Interface (Voluntary Action NL).

During the same period, 280 voluntary sector organisations listing a main premise in the Coatbridge area promoted 135 live volunteering opportunities through engagement with the Third Sector Interface. The most frequent genres of volunteering opportunities available in the local area were working with children or young people and working in a health or care setting. Based on the number of active volunteering opportunities in the local area, Voluntary Action North Lanarkshire estimates that approximately 12,000 individuals from the Coatbridge area engaged in volunteering during 2014-15 (conservative estimate including charity trustees).

Volunteering activity was also notable in the local area through opportunities provided by statutory partners, including NHS Lanarkshire (at Coathill Hospital). North Lanarkshire Council (mainly through Active Schools North Lanarkshire, North Lanarkshire Shopmobility, and Community Learning and Development), and Secondary Schools (clear evidence of senior pupil involvement in volunteering at Coatbridge High School, St Ambrose High School, and St Andrew's High School). Students of New College Lanarkshire also regularly volunteer.

- The Safety Zone Provides youth work services, a cafe and community hub for children, families and residents of Bargeddie.

- Deaf Services Lanarkshire Based in Coatbridge, providing a range of support services to the deaf community in Lanarkshire
- Lanarkshire Community Food and Health Partnership Works to maintain the Lanarkshire network of community run food and health initiatives, with central base in Bargeddie
- North Lanarkshire Leisure Ltd Charitable Trust delivering sport, recreation and health improvement services for local people
- Routes to Work Ltd Provides employability support, advice and guidance to local citizens from its Coatbridge office.

Brief synopsis of a few key national voluntary sector organisations with a significant footprint in the Coatbridge area:

- **DEBRA** Retail shop based in Coatbridge town centre contributes to fundraising to support those with EB skin disorder
- Enable Scotland Delivers services from its Coatbridge office to support children and adults who have learning disabilities
- Irish Diaspora in Scotland Association Promotes and celebrates the strong Irish cultural history in Scotland
- TCV Scotland Provides conservation and environmental support in and around the Drumpellier Country Park area.

HEALTH AND SOCIAL CARE

The voluntary sector, along with NHS Lanarkshire, North Lanarkshire Council and the Independent Care sector, played a key role in the delivery of North Lanarkshire's Reshaping Care for Older People Change Plan during the period 2011-15. Following on from the Change Plan, the voluntary sector is a central delivery partner in Scottish Government's Health and Social Care Integration agenda.

As part of a well-established Locality Partnership Development Programme, Glenboig Neighbourhood House is the lead organisation for the Coatbridge area for supporting and facilitating voluntary sector involvement in Health and Social Care Integration. A number of local voluntary sector organisations have been funded to deliver services that contribute to this agenda.
